She has conducted large scale evaluations, assessments and policy research for the UN, Red Cross and various NGOs on a range of humanitarian issues. Alexander's work has been featured in mainstream media outlets both domestically and internationally including the BBC, NPR, Al Jazeera and her writing published in the Washington Post, Slate, and IRIN News. She is two-time Fulbright grantee who received the award to study the use of child soldiers in Sierra Leone in 2006, and in 2019 to study Japan's approach to disaster risk reduction. She received a Master of Public Health and a Master of International Affairs from Columbia University. She is the author of *Chasing Chaos: My Decade In and Out of Humanitarian Aid* (Random House, 2013).
